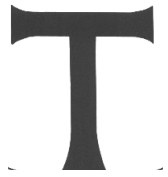

## Vicar's Voice



Recently some parishioners brought me a worship bulletin from another Episcopal church they visited while traveling. On the back of the bulletin, the names of the worship leaders were listed. The list began with this: "Ministers: The Entire Congregation".

The point they were making, of course, is that all baptized people have a ministry. We are all ministers, not just those wearing robes, and we all participate. This is one of the benefits brought about by the 1979 Prayer Book. What this means is that leadership in the church is more dispersed than it was in an earlier age. We've moved from a "top-down" model in which clergy made most of the important decisions, to more of a "bottom-up" model, where decisions are more likely to be made by conversation and consensus.

This parallels what is happening in many corporations and organizations today, as organizational pyramids are being flattened. The use of e-mail has transformed the way information is shared. It's easy to have a conversation by e-mail with an entire team so that everyone has a say in decisions that are made. Collaborative leadership is becoming more common.

I find that I'm more effective when I use a collaborative style of leadership in parish ministry. I prefer to listen to various points of view, bounce ideas around a group of people, consider alternatives and build consensus before coming to a decision. This isn't always a fast or efficient process, but I think it brings better results in the long run.

My personality thrives on humor, conversation, warmth, sharing, honesty, and vulnerability. I think those qualities lead to good collaborative decision-making. So when you hear me asking questions, exploring alternatives, sounding people out, and making suggestions, what I'm doing is exercising collaborative leadership.

There are times, of course, when firm, timely decisions must be made by the person in charge, and as the Vicar I'm aware of my canonical responsibilities. But in general I find that working together with others is the best way to move a parish forward. We are the Body of Christ, a community of believers that listens, shares, and makes decisions together. I hope you'll understand and join me in this new style of ministry.

## Anglican Moments Recap

Anglican Moments is a short teaching each Sunday on our Anglican heritage

**May 2 - Wine and water.** We use red wine in the Eucharist as a symbol of Christ's blood shed for us. The priest may add water to the wine to show that we are united to Christ in the Eucharist (the water of baptism is mingled with the spirit of Christ in the wine)

**May 9 - No Anglican moments.**

**May 16 - One chalice.** No matter how many chalices will be used in the administration of Communion, only one chalice is used during the Eucharistic prayer, to indicate that we are one in Christ. Similarly we use one bread to indicate we are one body united in Christ.

**May 23 - Pentecost Day.** The day of Pentecost recorded in the Acts of the Apostles was fifty days after the resurrection of Jesus, and so we celebrate Pentecost Day fifty days after Easter Day, recalling the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the disciples on that day.

**May 30 - Trinity Sunday.** This is the only Sunday dedicated to a doctrine of the Church, which tells us how central the doctrine of the Trinity is to the Christian faith. Understanding that God is One God in three persons - Father, Son, and Holy Spirit - prevents us from falling into many theological errors.

I would like to welcome back Charles Smith. He was missed and we are very glad to see him back.

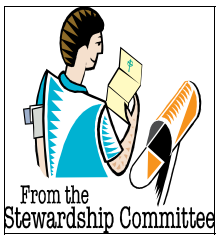

## “SO WHAT?” By Charles Smith, our Missionary in India



Okay, I went, I saw, but so what? I have many answers! I will share just a few of them here.

My missionary experience in the CSI Diocese of Dornakal has helped me to better understand the term ‘worldwide Anglican Communion’. I have seen the gospel of Christ and the epistles, particularly the letters of Saint Paul, in new (to me) ways.

Let me begin with my understanding of ‘being (the church) in the world, not (the church) of the world’. Until I went to Dornakal, India I had only experienced or even knew of dioceses that are based in significant (for their region) population and economic centers. The location of the cathedral in a town when cities are available in the diocese, and a town that is a people transit (railway) junction (i.e. just passing through) and not an economic center gave me new insight into ‘taking the gospel to the people’.

Jesus said, “Let the children come unto me.” I have been amazed at the number of children in church, particularly the poorer communities that I have had the privilege of visiting. It is true; at one parish I visited they said ‘there are not many children at this parish because Sunday school takes money instead of generating money for the church.’

However, most of the places I visited reaching out to the youth was one of the top priorities of the congregation. There was no assumption that it takes money (that is already in hand); the assumption was we need to be doing the work of God and have faith that he will show us the means to do it. For at least three of the congregations I visited (Epiphany Cathedral, Dornakal; St. Mary’s, Khammam; St. Peter’s, Madiriparum) this meant reaching out and providing education to the deaf, and those stricken with polio, the orphan and those too poor to afford tuition at the public schools and providing them with an education (and a hostel to stay at if home is too far away).

Many of those they reach out to are members of other faiths but they value what the church is offering so they come knowing it is a Christian School. I have much to learn! I hope to learn more and to share with others what I have seen so far about reaching out to the community of non-believers and believers of other faiths. I have also seen church building full beyond capacity *the day they were dedicated* with youth accounting for half of those attending; could it be a direct result?

Until now I had only experienced thanksgiving (harvest festival) in communities with a significant economy in the same community. What I saw in India is communities with economic means give (generously) of their money. Meanwhile communities with little or no economic means in their community give some money and even more generously of everything else that they have, particularly food staples (envision taking five minutes to bring up the offerings). **Charles Smith**

And also to Elizabeth Engler, our four-year old organizer, for a great job in arranging the toys on the shelves. Mary is creating a God-centered mini-curriculum for her little folks that includes stories, music and crafts. Check out the new registration form for parents to fill out with information about their children to help with safety standards. Since the nursery now shares the modular space with the early elementary Sunday School set, both groups are working to be respectful of each other’s needs.

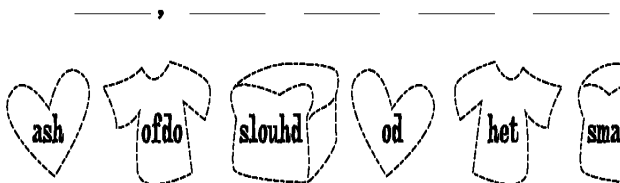
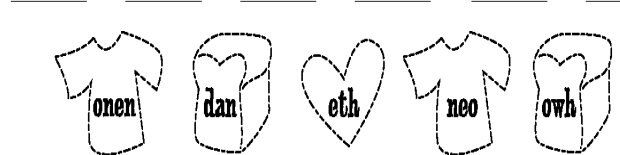
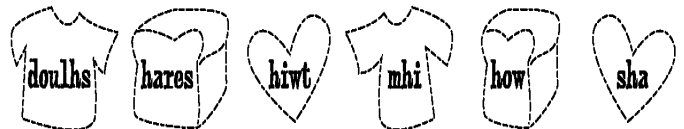
